### From the Rector's Desk

Pentecost. Originally, the Jewish feast where the first-fruits of the corn harvest were presented, fell 50 days after the Passover. To Christians, the day became honored for the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples as recorded in Acts 2.1. It has also been called Whitsunday (White-Son-Day — as it was customary for baptizands to wear white robes). Pentecost ranks after Easter in the chief feasts of the Church Year. We might also understand it to be our Inauguration Day. Just as Presidents and Governors have their day when the power of a political office is conferred, so it is that Christians remember the first day when powers Holy were conferred on us.



Holy Spirit and Holy Ghost are two simpler ascriptions of this Holy power conferred. Paraclete. Comforter. Advocate. Counselor. In either name, we find not a thing, but a presence; we are introduced to an experience, not a concept. English poet Gerald Manley Hopkins writes of the Spirit,

"[the Holy Spirit]...is just that, something that cheers the spirit of man, with signals and cries, all zealous that he should do something and full of assurance that if he will he can; calling him on, springing to meet him halfway, crying to his ears as to his heart, 'This way to do God's will; this way to save your soul: Come on, come on!"

Come on then, People of Holy Spirit! See the signal and cries, hear the voice calling forth our obedience and action. Feel the conferring of God's Holy Power, providing the grace to accomplish that which we have been given the will to do.

My thanks to Fr. Phil for his guidance and leadership. Special thanks, also, to Linda Romanoski (the Parish Administrator) and Barbara Burton (one of our long-term fixtures). They are always available to direct me to where I need to go or what I need to do. God blessed me by leading me to CHS. I will always be grateful. For those wonderful people who keep asking, and offering help, I am almost set in my new apartment. Still don't have places to put things – but I'm not giving up!!

Acclimating to the role of Junior Warden has been a blast. We have an excellent Vestry and I would encourage anyone with an interest to attend our next meeting. Vestry meetings are open to the entire parish. On to business...

Our technology initiative is moving forward, even if a bit slowed by other ongoing projects. We have been approved by Google as a non-profit, and will start to set up our G-Suite account. This will pave the way for Google Calendars, which we hope to have in place soon.



The Rectory and main Church projects are underway, although we have hit a few administrative hurdles during the process. Without going into the lengthy saga of why we need multiple approvals from the township for the up-and-coming rectory renovation, the end result is that we are on track for final approval soon.

Looking to the expansion of the First Steps facility, we now have a proposed plan that will not only allow them to expand; it will upgrade the institutional code for that section of the building. This means that in the future, that space can be used for things other than a children's daycare. Why should you care? None of us knows what is going to happen in 10 years, and we are making sure that we can adjust with the needs of the community.

Last and not least, I would like to thank the Youth Ministry for undertaking an energy audit of CHS. Their efforts were coordinated by Julie Stein and Michelle Marlow. The group brought a number of items to our attention where energy could be saved and also pointed to parts of the facility that require some adjustments. The efforts of these great young people will make CHS a more efficient place and help us in our stewardship of God's resources.


# A Message from the Treasurer

Dear Friends,

Our Finance Committee continues to meet monthly to update and review our income and expenses. As we enter the second third  $\binom{1}{3}$  of the year, here is an update to our 2017 financial position. As I write this message we have four recorded months of financial activity; Jan – April 2017.

Our primary source of revenue is the pledge income we receive from those of you who made a pledge, and those who have made non-pledge and plate contributions. Over the last seventeen weeks, the rate of pledge contributions has begun to align with the budgeted contribution schedule:

With this rate of contribution, we are now \$22,237 ahead of schedule due to pledges that are paid up for the fiscal year creating a temporary cushion, this will even out as the year progresses. Well done!

Our Auction Gala was held on April 28<sup>th</sup>. Please refer to Marge Keller's report on page 15. The numbers presented therein will be finalized and incorporated into future Treasurer's reports.

On the expenditure side, the church staff and budget holders continue to be diligent stewards. The operating costs which are mostly fixed are being well managed. The chart below shows how we are performing against our operating budget. The challenge this summer will be managing cash flow during the Rectory renovation. The renovation provides a wonderful opportunity for CHS, but the expenditures being incurred were not anticipated in the 2017 budget.

For July — Pasta and/or sauce



# From our Deacon in Training: Michelleslie Maltese-Nehrbass

In case you missed our introduction to Michelleslie in the last issue and have not yet had an opportunity to meet her, here's a reprise of the short piece we ran in April-May. With one change: your editor was incorrect in her assumption that Michelleslie would be with us only until the end of the year. Her training program dictates that she worship with us until her ordination.

Michelleslie has been a member of Calvary Church in Flemington for 20 years and has lived in Raritan Township for 29 years. She received a BA in Communication with a concentration in health communication from the College of New Jersey in 2011 and is halfway through the 3-year Deacon Formation/Training Program; her ordination date is January 2019. In addition to her time with us, Michelleslie is taking Clinical Pastoral Education [CPE] courses in Deacon Formation as well as CPE outside of Deacon Formation as an intern in a clinical setting at Capital Health.

Below is her explanation of what Clinical Pastoral Education is for those of us who are not aware of this ministry. [Ed note: We were speaking recently about this and Michelleslie commented that she finds CPE to be very like our 'We Care' Group. We bring God's love to those who are in need of comfort, and there is no better example of this than how our beautiful church community has wrapped its arms around each other in recent weeks when we were faced with unexpected and unspeakable tragedy.]

In ministry, we are always working with individuals. Working effectively one-on-one involves courses in Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE). Clinical Pastoral Education was conceived as a method of learning pastoral practice in a clinical setting under supervision. CPE is required in seminary, deacon formation and chaplaincy. CPE is about meeting people who are in crisis and working to bring them to a place of acknowledgement and eventually change. Chaplains spread God's light in the darkness. The power in CPE does not come

from the individuals in crisis or the chaplain — the power comes from God.

Chaplains walk alongside those who are going through trauma, transformation, and transition, and with those who are in spiritual homelessness. Working with an individual requires a pastoral assessment which encompasses a matrix of understanding that must be reached — in some cases — quickly. The chaplains may ask themselves; What defines this person? What is going on? Why is this situation the way that it is? At the same time, the individual may wonder if the chaplain can be trusted. Is the chaplain going to judge me? Do you think I'll be okay?

A chaplain must be aware of asking too many questions, which can lead to transference and/or countertransference. Questions can put people on the defensive and imply that answers are expected. Transference is what the individual projects onto you. Countertransference is what about their story strikes or stirs up things in you, and this can happen easily to a chaplain. Pastoral work takes place among the chaplain, the individual seeking pastoral guidance, and God. The encounter is not about the chaplain trying to fix, diagnose or judge the individual, the conversation or their past or present actions. It is, rather, about encouraging and empowering people to examine their complicated lives and experiences: those that have brought them to where they are today.


In CPE, we learn *how* to learn from our ministry, to become more effective by attending the realities of the human condition. Chaplains provide pastoral spiritual care, guidance and support for those in crisis, joy, anxiety, loss and pain. Faith is a way to help with confusion and the healing process.

# Good Friday Day of Service

Many thanks to a wonderful gathering on Good Friday, 2017!! Over 100 people participated in the day, which began in Dove Hall for a lovely breakfast compliments of the Vestry. The commissioning service followed in the sanctuary, with three groups (12 of whom initially began work at Good News Home) with over twenty departing for Mr. Fixit projects, helping seniors with homes located from Glen Gardner, to Whitehouse, to Flemington, and Milford. A potted plant was left at each stop. Three adults and more than twenty teens went to Grow-a-Row in Pittstown (from whom we have already received a letter of thanks)!! Sixteen women made thirty-eight beautiful and colorful pillow cases for Safe in Hunterdon, and nine ditty bags for Seamen's Institute. Almost fifteen parishioners polished silver, cleaned the sanctuary, and worked in the kitchen and gardens at CHS, while another twenty worked on the rectory and grounds. I think it's safe to say "a good time was had by all" and we were blessed with a really beautiful Good Friday Day of Service.
