Dear Ones,

"I watch this morning for the light that the darkness has not

overcome. I watch for the fire that was in the beginning and that burns still in the brilliance of the rising sun. I watch for the glow of life that gleams in the growing earth and glistens in sea and sky. I watch for your light, O God, in the eyes of every living creature and in the ever-living flame of my own soul. If the grace of seeing were mine this day I would glimpse you in all that lives. Grant me the grace of seeing this day. Grant me the grace of seeing this day.

This quote is from the Celtic teacher and author John Powell Newell and it speaks of the light in the darkness, the fire, the rising sun, the glow of life, God's light, glistening sea and sky, and the ever-living flame of our souls. All these pictorial words describe light. Can you see each of them shining brightly in your imagination? I believe, as human beings inhabiting this fragile earth, we are all called to be a light to the world. We each bring light into the room with our presence, our words, and our actions. We may never know how our light affects others. Our light may well be an answer to their prayers.

Our light to the world can be seen in our kind words, our stories, our listening ears, our letters of encouragement, our singing, our laughter, our sharing of food or a recipe, and our every interaction, no matter how small. It demonstrates to others we are thinking of them and honoring them with the gift of ourselves. God has given us each gifts and it is our responsibility as inhabitants of our world to demonstrate and use these gifts as often as possible.

Doesn't it feel great to have someone say, "Gee, I like how your hair looks."? Doesn't it feel great to send a letter to a loved one and receive one in return? Doesn't it feel great to have someone listen attentively to what you have to say without any judgment? When these occasions happen, they truly warm our hearts like the light, the fire, and the sun do.

So in the month ahead, let us each demonstrate when we can that we are truly a light to the world. I believe the more we can be this light, the happier and more fulfilled we will feel. It will not make us appear weak, but rather strong in our commitment to be a good human being. And as we all know, positivity begets more positivity. This can be achieved no matter where we are. It will take effort on our part, but the rewards will be overwhelming. We will receive much more than we ever give.

I send many blessings for each of you and your families. I pray your next month continues to find you healthy and content.

Palm Sunday, March 28, 2021

Greetings from the Church of the Holy Spirit community. We want you to know that you are in our thoughts and prayers every day.

As Lent has come to a close and we enter Holy Week on this Palm Sunday, I have been thinking about what it means to encounter Jesus in my life. Recently, a portion of Chapter 12 of John's Gospel, which describes the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem, was read

at a Sunday service at our church. John writes "The next day the great crowd that had come to the festival heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him shouting 'Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord - the King of Israel." John writes that at first the disciples of Jesus did not understand the crowd's reaction to Jesus. Here were the people who were closest to Jesus. They had seen the wonderous things that He had done and heard His preaching firsthand. Yet, they did not understand what was happening.

Later in the chapter, John writes "Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him. 'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.'" These people were Gentiles (non-Jews), complete strangers, who wanted to meet Jesus. We do not hear whether they ever got to meet Jesus, but we know that they wanted to encounter Him.

I feel like the Greeks in this chapter. Unlike the disciples, I can never know Jesus in person, but I want to encounter Him. And I do, not only through prayer, but also in others who strive to be Christ-like in their lives. One of the most meaningful ways that I have encountered Jesus is through the women in our Bible Study and Shawl Ministry groups at Edna Mahan. I have been awed by the powerful faith that many of the women have. Jesus is a real presence in their lives. I like to say that when I am at Bible Study at Edna Mahan, I feel the real presence of Jesus in the room. I see Jesus in how those women behave and what they have to say. Their heavily used Bibles say it all. These are people who have a deep and abiding faith. They are the children of light that John writes about when he quotes Jesus in Chapter 12 as saying "The light is with you for a little longer. Walk while you have the light, so that the darkness may not overtake you. If you walk in the darkness, you do not know where you are going. While if you have the light, believe in the light, so that you may become children of light."

Have a blessed Holy Week and a Happy Easter. Know that you are in our hearts. We anxiously await the day that we can see each other again.

Treasurer's report

As of the end of February our financial results for 2021 were as follows:

Thank you to those that have sent in a pledge for 2021. According to the pledge clerk, we have received 66 pledges in the amount of \$180,966 so far. Our budget goal is \$190,000 for 2021, so we are slightly behind at this point. If you haven't sent in your pledge, you may still do so via mail to the Church or by contacting our pledge clerk, Eva Lesniak.

A couple of notes regarding our finances:

- † Our revenue number is slightly high due to the fact that all prepaid 2021 pledges that were donated in 2020 are applied to the books in January. This amount is almost \$15,000.
- † Our PPP loan from 2020 in the amount of \$29,205 was forgiven by the SBA on February 25th. These loan proceeds were earmarked for salaries in 2020 so the funds will be reflected in our financials in March, now that the loan is no longer a liability.
- † We applied for a second PPP loan in early March and were approved for \$20,210. Again, these funds will be used for salaries in 2021. We expect to be able to apply for loan forgiveness near the end of the year. This new loan will be a liability and will not show on our monthly financial reports per Diocesan guidelines.
- † Our 2020 Parochial Report (a multi-page document outlining our finances, church programs and Church services) was submitted in March to both the Diocese and the National Church.

Thank you to all parishioners who added CHS as their charity in the Amazon Smile program. We continue to receive quarterly distributions from Amazon as a percentage of items purchased. CHS received almost \$175 from your purchases in February.

Stay healthy and hope to see you in person in the near future. Thank you for your continued financial, time and talent support of CHS.



Holy Hikes is a nationwide network of Christian ministries committed to rebuilding communion with all of creation. It was begun in 2020 by the Reverend Justin Cannon in the Episcopal Diocese of California. He realized there are opportunities to worship God in the outdoors, in praise to Him for the beauty and stewardship we all enjoy. These hikes are held year-round in what John Muir has called God's "first temples" – which could be in our local parks, along our favorite hiking trails, or perhaps beside our shorelines.

I began the NJ chapter of Holy Hikes in January, and my plan is to schedule hikes each month on a Saturday morning. So far, I have conducted hikes locally, along the Ken Lockwood Gorge and on Cushetunk Mountain. Attendance has grown, and I'm hopeful that we will continue to attract hikers from all around, regardless of religious background or church affiliation. Our March hike included staff and students from the RVCC community in addition to familiar faces from Holy Spirit.

The structure of the hikes, as Justin has outlined, should ideally follow a liturgical service. I generally arrange for four "stops" along the way: a Collect, a lesson from that week's lectionary, a poem, and then the Peace at the end. Hikers are asked to interpret these readings as they walk along and share if they feel so moved. Or, if they want to just call our attention to a bird or a particular view, that's okay too!

Because this is a new ministry at CHS, I'm open to new hike locations if you have a particular favorite in the central NJ area. I like to keep our hikes under 2 hours if possible since folks may have other things to do on their Saturdays! If you have ideas on spreading the word or have a hiking trail which you would like to feature some month, contact me at Julie Stine@yahoo.com. Our next hike is scheduled for Saturday, April 17th at 9:00 am at Hacklebarney State Park.



Eucharist in Spanish

Many years ago, my husband, Jim, and I served as missioners to Cristo Rey, our adopted sister parish in Trenton. Our commitment was to be there one Sunday a month to assist in the mass, with Sunday School and youth group among other duties Fr. Pozo asked of us. We also took groups of young people and adults to work on Good Friday and to experience the Latino culture first hand.

I hope to reinstitute that program once churches are allowed to open fully. I want you to experience what many other experienced in the past. To that end, I hope you will accompany me to Trenton where we will attend the mass in Spanish with people of many central American countries, Mexico and Puerto Rico.

To help you feel more comfortable, I will start teaching the mass in Spanish via Zoom beginning on **April 20th at 7:00 pm**. You already know the prayers; saying them in Spanish is a matter of pronunciation. I want you to understand what is happening and to be able to participate with the other congregants. Good Friday Service Day Once Removed

While we were unable to hold our annual Service Day last year and this, we have forwarded that tradition to **Saturday**, **May 1** starting at 9:00 am. The project will be to clean up the area around the church yard and parking lot and will include weeding, trimming shrubbery, raking up leaves and other debris and spreading mulch in the garden beds. All hands are welcome including children, as this is an outdoors activity.

As with our normal Service Day, bring work gloves, rakes, clippers, garden shovels or other gardening equipment. Since we expect this work to take several hours, we will order individually wrapped subs to enjoy while socializing and physical distancing. Water will be provided. And don't forget your masks!

Room by Room—a tidy-up project

As we have not been able to occupy the building for our normal use, many areas of the church require a tidy-up—clearing out 'stuff', dusting, wipe down tables, etc. and sweeping. We will be scheduling this on a room by room basis, on weekday afternoons, some Saturdays, too. To maintain social distancing, we will need one to two persons per room and we hope you will be able to offer up a few hours, as you are able. Masks and rubber gloves should be considered. We will supply the cleaning products needed.

Box City 2021

Sanctuary Technology Upgrade

A team of twelve has been meeting since January to plan and implement a significant technology upgrade in the Sanctuary.

Three cameras that can pan and zoom have been installed up on the transept corner beams and above the doors into the sanctuary. New ethernet cabling has been run to improve the church's local area network. The church's internet speed has been increased fourfold to improve streaming of our worship services through Zoom and Facebook Live. New audiovisual production equipment will better manage the ongoing broadcasting of our hybrid worship services. Members of the team have been "ringing out the room" during Holy Week to synchronize audio and video feeds.


A group of CHS volunteers has worked for the past few months to enhance the sound and video quality of CHS's worship. Realizing that in the future our services will be hybrid – both in-person at church and remote via Zoom and Facebook Live – steps have been taken to improve how we experience our spiritual life together.

A new audio system recommended by Chris Varga [Vicki Brooks's son] employs a new soundboard with audio inputs from personal microphones, the ambo microphone, and microphones for the organ. These will feed not only the interior speakers, but also the sound going out on Zoom and Facebook Live feeds.

Three PTZ cameras have been mounted in the sanctuary to provide Zoom and Facebook Live worshippers with clear video of the worship from several angles, and will enable doing away with the laptop computer in the center of the worship space. [PTZ stands for pan, tilt and zoom, giving great flexibility no matter how the worship space is configured.] All are controlled via a new computer with double monitors mounted just behind the organ console. The cameras have a wired connection which necessitated running cables through the walls, challenging the skills of Fr. Phil, John Higgins, Jim West and Dave Scott, who were also responsible for mounting the cameras.

Researching the equipment and configuring the computer and software were John Rollins and Dave Dabour, supported by Chris Varga. Heading up the general project, assisting in placing the orders and general follow-up were Eva Lesniak, Marge Keller, Jan Paxton, Tom McGrew, and Dot Hospador. All this would not have been possible without the support of many, including some very generous anonymous gifts.

Stay tuned! The upgrade is almost done and began to be implemented on Easter!
